PRÉCIS

After South Africa's reentry into international community in the 1990s, the country has entered a number of bilateral agreements in the fields of arts and culture, education and science. These involve many of South Africa's departments, which engage in international relations. However, ECP is not awarded enough attention and funds from the government to establish a sustainable reputation abroad. Similarly, central coordination and a long-term strategy for South Africa's ECP objectives is still lacking.

Outstanding Fact:

The first successful human-to-human heart transplant was done in South Africa – a fact still proudly presented as part of South Africa's science diplomacy.



The Department of International Relations and Cooperation does not carry out activities relating to ECP. Rather, the activities are coordinated by the individual departments relating to the ECP subfields, namely the Department of Sports, Arts and Culture (DAC), the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET), the Department of Science and Innovation and the Department of Communication. These government bodies are supported through a number of arms-length organizations that support South Africa's ECP, such as the National Arts Council (NAC) and the Academy of Science of South Africa.

CURRENT ISSUES AND DEVELOPMENTS

- South Africa has focused on strengthening a multidisciplinary cultural diplomacy through its Cultural Seasons abroad. After previous cultural seasons in France, UK, Russia and China, South Africa has decided to focus only on African states starting in 2017. A study conducted in 2019 found that previous cultural seasons had no measurable impact on South Africa's trade, tourism or investment levels.
- After the Department of Arts and Culture was merged with the Department of Sports and Recreation in 2019, the newly formed department brought up the potential for a stronger integration of sports diplomacy in the cultural diplomacy portfolio.
- In spite of the programs offered and the presence of a "International Relations" division in many departments, there is no coherent ECP strategy or central coordination of activities.
